





This Reading Challenge is designed to get children to read more, reflect on and discuss their reading, interact with authors, and connect with other readers like themselves.



WHO IS IT FOR?

- Children from Grades 4-6 (in the Academic Year 2025-26) who love to read.
- Parents, librarians, teachers, siblings or other adults who wish to nominate young readers.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

- There are two Tracks for the Challenge: the Competitive and the Non-Competitive Track.
- A Reading Schedule is shared at the start of the Challenge to help the participants navigate their reading.

HOW DOES THE NON-COMPETITIVE TRACK WORK?

Readers who wish to pursue
the Non-Competitive Track may
read any or all of the books on
the reading list, and will get the
chance to interact with acclaimed
global and Indian authors

during the Author Interaction sessions we host on Zoom. They soak in the reading experience at their own pace.





HOW DOES THE COMPETITIVE TRACK WORK?

- Readers participate in teams of 3 members, mentored by a Reading Guide.
- School librarians, coordinators, or interested adults (parents, Reading Guides) pick students to form teams to enroll in the Competitive Track.
- Each team in the Competitive Track is expected to read 2 to 3 books every week.
 Eg. if there are a total of 3 books to read in a week, each team member can read 1 book that week.
- The students also get the chance to attend the Author Interaction sessions we host on Zoom.

These students also maintain a Reading Log that is updated regularly. The Reading Guide will be responsible for ensuring that the teams keep up with the Reading







HOW ARE THE WINNERS OF THE COMPETITIVE TRACK CHOSEN?

The teams on the Competitive

Track will participate in one or more
quizzes which will be held virtually
in the last two weeks of August.

Questions will be based on the 30
books the participants are expected
to read, as well as the Author
Interaction sessions.

The best teams will qualify for the in-person Grand Finale Quiz which will be held in Bengaluru, India, on September 21, 2025, during the Neev Literature Festival. The three best teams will win Gold/Silver/Bronze engraved trophies, certificates of achievement, and a great set of books!





HOW DO PARTICIPANTS RECEIVE UPDATES REGARDING THE CHALLENGE?

I AM AN INDIVIDUAL; HOW CAN I PARTICIPATE?


You can participate in the Non-Competitive Track as an individual. However, if you're looking to participate in the Competitive Track, form a team with two friends and get an adult to be your Reading Guide.

WHAT DOES A READING GUIDE DO, AND WHO CAN BE A READING GUIDE?

Reading Guides supervise their students' reading, providing support and clarifying queries when required.

They share the links of the author interaction sessions with the students and ensure that the students attend the sessions. Reading Guides also monitor the students on the Competitive Track during the virtual quizzes.

A parent/guardian, teacher/librarian, or even an elder sibling can be a Reading Guide.





I AM A PARENT/TEACHER/ LIBRARIAN/INTERESTED ADULT AND I WANT MY STUDENTS TO PARTICIPATE, HOW DO I GO ABOUT IT?

If you're looking at having your child participate in the Non-Competitive Track, you can fill the registration form on the NLF website, and watch out for the updates we will be sharing through email and social media.

If you're looking at having them participate in the Competitive Track, then you'll have to bring in two more participants from Grades 4-6, and be their Reading Guide or find another adult who can supervise the team's reading.

After forming a team and finding a
Reading Guide, the Reading Group can
register for the Reading Challenge by
filling the registration form.


Any one member of the Group or the Group's Reading Guide can register on behalf of the whole team. Members of the same team need not register for the Reading Challenge separately.

Do note that schools with 5+ teams in the Competitive Track are expected to host their teams on a Saturday in late August for the qualifier round of the Quiz, so that teachers can monitor the students as they attempt the quiz online. Inter-school teams and teams from schools with fewer than five registrations are required to log in to a Zoom call, where they will be monitored by members of the NLF Team as they attempt the quiz.



CAN COMPETITIVE TRACK TEAMS BE COMPOSED OF STUDENTS FROM DIFFERENT SCHOOLS?

Yes, we allow inter-school teams to compete in the Reading Challenge. If you are an inter-school team, please mark yourself as such in the Registration Form.

WILL I GET A PARTICIPATION CERTIFICATE IF I'M NOT A WINNER IN THE GRAND FINALE QUIZ?

All students who qualify for the Grand Finale Quiz will be given certificates.

They will also attend the Neev
Literature Festival, where they will be
able to meet celebrated authors and
illustrators, purchase books from a
curated Marketplace, get their books
signed, and attend sessions and
workshops conducted by industry exp

The Neev Literature Festival will bear the travel and accommodation costs for all finalists.



CURATORIAL VISION

The NLF Reading Challenge 2025 Book
List brings together the best of
children's literature available in the
Indian market, striving to push children's
reading horizons, encouraging them to
look beyond the bestsellers that
dominate the market, while taking into
account availability, affordability,
and student interests.

Participants will read not just highly regarded books published in recent years, but also contemporary classics of children's literature such as *Haroun and the Sea of Stories* by Salman Rushdie.

They will read across genres and forms, including T.S. Eliot's whimsical collection of poems *Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats*, and visual narratives like *P.N.K Panicker's Ghost Stories* and *The Other Side of Tomorrow*. There are two books—*Movies Showing Nowhere* and *Kiki's Delivery Service*—in translation from Dutch and Japanese respectively.



The list features stories that champion environmental awareness, explore disabilities, celebrate found families, critique censorship. There are wild, wacky stories guaranteed to leave readers in splits; there are eerie stories; there are stories that will break hearts and knit them back together with hope.


From rural Tamil Nadu to Costa Rica, from post-Partition India to dystopian futures and magical elseworlds, the titles on our list travel across time and space and the boundaries of reality.

We hope they invite young readers to keep their imaginations "big, sharp, and hungry," to cultivate a sense of wonder "that the world, in all its dangers and clumsiness, in all its beauties and miracles, demands of us," in the words of beloved author Katherine Rundell.


